

use the library!!

Members who are interested in the improvements won for Forest Lodge Primary School may recall the article by Jim Coombs in last October's Bulletin. He recalled the vigorous campaign for better facilities and the subsequent great changes but pointed out that the school may lose the chances that the new facilities provide just because the community is not supporting the school it fought for. The falling numbers at the school, despite the newest and best facilities in Glebe, will mean fewer staff and reduced possibilities.

A similar situation is occurring with the Glebe Library. The people of Glebe are simply not supporting it enough. And yet the library has good facilities and even a garden with trees. The children's section is very good but gets far less attention than it deserves. The lack of support must also jeopardise the Glebe Library's importance in the eyes of the powers that allocate funds, giving the impression that Glebe is a strange non-reading outpost of civilization (of which Leichhardt is, of course, the hub!!). The lack of borrowers also tends to make the staff's job rather tedious and frustrating.

Jacqueline Barrett, who works three evenings a week in the Library and is also an active member of the Glebe Society, has kindly provided the Bulletin with an article on the Library's facilities. It may well be that many people are not aware of the extent of facilities available. The library staff would like nothing better than to be run off their feet by Glebe borrowers.

- So: if you can make more use of the library, do - otherwise, recommend the library to people who dont use it, particularly new-comers to Glebe.

The library opens on Saturdays from 9.30 am to 12.00 noon, on Mon., Wed., and Fri. from 10.30 am to 8.30 pm, and on Tues. and Thurs. from 10.30 am to 5.00 pm. (These hours are new ones starting from Wednesday March 8th).

Six books and two magazines may be borrowed for four weeks, and books may be renewed once. When you come, bring some official proof of your address, and borrow as much as you can.

Dress rules are restricted to not distracting others from reading, and knowing that the floor is squeaky for rubber soles. Dogs are preferred outside, as the children's section is carpeted.

SYDNEY YOUTH HOSTEL

In the Glebe Society Bulletin of September 1976 we published an article by Richard Willis, Secretary of the YHA and member of the Glebe Society, setting out the history of the mansion that has become the Sydney Youth Hostel and the story of the plans and efforts of the YHA to put the building to the best use possible while retaining the 'atmosphere' of the mansion.

The building was officially opened as a youth hostel on 31 October 1977 and Richard Willis has kindly provided the Bulletin with information on the Hostel's first year of activities, as set out below.

When the Association purchased the building it had deteriorated into almost a wreck, which was being used as a doss house. A vast amount of work had to be done on the building to bring it up to the required standards. Although it had been hoped that 30 beds could be provided, health regulations allowed only 20.

The hostel has been very busy since the opening, achieving an annual occupancy factor of 95.7%. But on many nights hostellers have to be turned away as there are no beds available. In the summer months it is most common for the Resident Warden to speak personally to 30 - 40 people who cannot get accommodation that night.

Because of the limit on the beds, groups of non-members are not accepted even though one of the prime functions of a youth hostel is to provide low-cost accommodation for young people such as school groups.

When Stage II is completed it is anticipated that there will be 80 beds and that groups of young people on education excursions, sports teams etc will use the hostel as they do other youth hostels

(there now being more than 4,500 in 50 countries). Due to lack of funds the Association is not able to proceed with Stage II of this project as yet.

The non acceptance of school groups is reflected in the age range of those who used the hostel in its first twelve months:

seniors (18 and over) 6,504 juniors (17 and under) 486 6,990

These overnights were recorded by a yearly total of 2,842 Australians and 4,148 from overseas. The Australian overnights were as follows:

Most of these hostellers used public transport.



FLETCHERS:

At the last meeting of Council approval was given for the extensions to Fletchers. As pointed out in the last Bulletin there is the strong possibility of the trucks taking a one-way route that will bring the trucks through Forsyth St. RESIDENTS OF FERRY RD AND FORSYTH ST SHOULD WATCH OUT FOR THE TRUCKS. If trucks do come through Forsyth St, residents should take their numbers and complain loudly to the Town Clerk, the local aldermen and to Fletchers.

TREES :

At the Council Meeting of 21 March the Council approved the following motion:

That Council agree to the request for removal of the trees and their replacement with a more suitable species and that similar action be taken progressively in regard to the other poplar trees in Glebe Point Road if the need is evidenced; that it be noted that it is not Council's intention to indiscriminately remove trees in Glebe Point Road but any poplars removed will be replaced with more suitable species and no tree will be removed until after thorough examination.

This motion was considered far less satisfactory than the position adopted by the Glebe Society in the press release and the petition, so in advance of the meeting Eric Gidney coordinated a letter-boxing campaign to get residents to attend the Council meeting. Despite the short notice and the postal strike, enough Glebe residents turned out to fill the public gallery at the meeting. At the meeting Alderman Origlass spoke against this amended motion. Unfortunately, Alderman Kelly who had caused the amendment to be moved was not present. Tom Drake-Brockman spoke as representative of the residents, pointing out at some length the desirability of the poplars and arguing that none of the trees was in fact diseased. What the poplars need is more care and attention, not removal. Nonetheless the amended motion was passed.

It now appears that the Council has already ear-marked several trees for removal. It is important that members watch for any attempt to remove the trees. If an attempt is made, several steps can be taken. If the tree is between Glebe Post Office and Broadway, contact Tom Drake-Brockman of the Angel Pavement on 660-5395; if in the other section of Glebe Pt. Rd., contact Eric Gidney on 660-5093. The motion binds the Council to the conditions of evident need for action and for a thorough examination to have been made. Both these questions should be raised strongly with members of the Tree Preservation Committee, whose members are Aldermen Baldwin, Cawley, Millard and Rocks, and the engineer in charge, Mr MacAuley, and engineer Mr Wilson. Eric Gidney recommends that the environmental aspect be taken up with Alderman Cawley, and that Mr MacAuley be pressed as to whether a 'thorough inspection' has been made and by people of what competence.
