In April 1977, the Glebe Society held its first Asian Night, partly as a function for members but particularly as an attempt to get to know people who don't usually attend Glebe Society functions : overseas students, migrants, people from overseas who for whatever reason are now living in Glebe. The themes of that night were mainly Indian and Indonesian.

This year the Society has had the great good fortune to have gained the full support of the Pakistani community of Sydney. Members of the Pakistani community are presenting a full program of entertainments and a large supper of authentic Pakistani food. The program includes :

- a display of handicrafts, art and jewelry
- films
- a fashion parade
- a play
- songs and music
- supper and refreshments.

Everyone is welcome to the Pakistani - Australia Night, and members are asked to bring along people from overseas now resident in Glebe.

"GEORGE DREYFUS PLAYS, SINGS AND CHATS"

Don't miss this one-man show by George Dreyfus which received excellent reviews when it played at La Mama last year, and which will start at the Nimrod right after its Glebe Society debut. Like the Gerald Hendrie recital, this evening has been arranged by Heather Stewart (Minerva Music Management) together with the Glebe Society.

George Dreyfus is most well-known for his film scores, but has had a much wider and varied career and output, including opera, ballet, symphonies and chamber music. He has a particular reputation as a wit and something of an eccentric. After his performance, the audience will have a chance to meet George Dreyfus over coffee and cheese.

GEORGE DREYFUS at La Mama: 11th June 5

An evening of music and talk in which local composer and musician George Dreyfus plays and simultaneously chats about his work.

Dreyfus having composed the music for *Marion*, *Let the Balloon Go*, *Power Without Glory*, *Break of Day*, *Rush* and even Tim Burstall's first children's films *Sebastian* *The Fox*.

However his operatic sorties; *The Gill-edged Kid* and *Loony Tunes* are more interesting and deserve a wider airing.

COMPOSER George Dreyfus is playing his big hits at La Mama in Carlton at the moment. Best known for his TV themes. Dreyfus also writes operas which seem to get more exposure in the US than in Australia.

The La Mama season constitutes an intimate portrait of Dreyfus the musician and Dreyfus the man. He combines his music on bassoon and keyboards with idiosyncratic and whimsical chat with the audience.

The real surprise of the evening came from the late show, which would certainly have made it into "critics choice," had I not caught up with it on the last night.

This was George Dreyfus at La Mama, a delightful hour or so with one of Australia's top film score composers, chatting about his music and friends, singing songs from his operas and playing his film music on an unlikely bassoon.

What made it work was the warm personality and dry humour of Dreyfus, who, if he had no musical ability, could easily have made a living as a stand-up comic.

coffee mornings:

At the beginning of each month (except January), the Society holds a Coffee Morning. Although modest in scope, these mornings are among the most frequent of the Society's social events. Those of us who attend regularly are familiar with the organisation and know how pleasant they can be. Other members, however, might like to learn more about these mornings.

They are usually held on the first Saturday of the month, from 10.30 am to 12.30 pm, in one of the members' homes. Arrangements are made as simple as possible, both for the host members and for those attending. One of the Society's members acts as organiser and takes all the necessary equipment round to the house. This includes plastic cups - no washing up - coffee, tea, milk, sugar and biscuits. The hosts, then, have only to supply the venue, the hot water, and of course their good will. The charge to members, at present, is 20 cents.

The purpose of the Coffee Mornings is to provide an informal, friendly place where members can get together, during or after their Saturday morning shopping, for a chat and a chance to meet some people in the local community. Such informal, pleasant meeting places tend to be rather rare in a busy inner-city suburb.

The idea of Coffee Mornings originated with Maureen Colman when she was Social Activities Convenor for the Society, in 1971. During that year, the first Coffee Morning was held by Kathie and Albert Mispel at their home near Wentworth Park, overlooking Blackwattle Bay. Under Maureen's able management, the organisation of the Coffee Mornings got off to a good start, and they have continued up until the present day.

They are open to all members of the Society (and their friends), and although there tends to be a majority of women, lately there have been more men present. On a regular basis, it would be good to see more male faces around. New members are especially welcome and it is a pleasantly casual way of meeting some of the longstanding members.

As 'Coffee Morning Person' for 1977-78 (ending July), I would like to thank, on behalf of the Society, all those generous people who have held or are about to hold a Coffee Morning in their home. I would also

like to thank Pat Moore, who looks after things when I am not able to be present.

The person arranging Coffee Mornings for the 1978-79 year (starting August), will be again Maureen Colman. I wish her good luck and I am sure she will be pleased to hear from any member who would be willing to hold a morning in the coming months, (phone : 660-2302).

COUNCIL FOR CIVIL LIBERTIES

Members may not be aware that the Council for Civil Liberties has its office in Glebe (149 St Johns Rd., 660-7582) and that the Council holds a number of activities to which our members are most welcome. The Council was formed in 1963 and has been in Glebe since 1971. For the last five years it has been holding a series of monthly Open Nights, usually on the second Wednesday of the month, at the address given above. Recent topics include 'The patients' bill of rights' and 'Special Branch, secret files and privacy'. The Council also holds barbecues in Glebe and in the mountains. In July the Council will be holding its Inaugural Civil Liberties Endowment Lecture at which Don Dunstan will speak.
