MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE MEETING -FEBRUARY

Changes to the Committee: Judy Casimir has been co-opted to fill the vacancy on the Committee.

Michael Lindley and Andrew Wood are interested in monitoring activities at Wentworth Park.

Michael's wife, Toni, has offered to be the Society's librarian.

Harold Park Sign: The Society has received a letter from Leichhardt Council, informing us that hearings regarding a proposed large neon sign at Harold Park have been set down for 5th, 6th and 9th April. It was our understanding that this case had been dismissed due to lack of representatives from the Trotting Club and Adam Neon. (See page 2 and December Bulletin).

The Harold Park sub-Committee has been informed and will no doubt do its best to represent the interests of residents.

Glebe Neighbourhood Centre: Betty Wright and Judy Casimir offered to attend the Centre's A.G.M. on behalf of the Society.

The Society's Archives: Neil Macindoe has established the whereabouts of most of our archival material. Toni Lindley will advise the Committee on the best way to organise these documents.

Freedom of Information Bill: We are writing to obtain a copy of the proposed Freedom of Information Bill to check the extent to which it will help or hinder us when we need information to prepare submissions on matters of local importance.

House Inspection: We intend to hold a House Inspection towards the end of the year. Details later.



FREEWAYS - Neil Macindoe

You will perhaps not be surprised to learn that no further information about the re-elected State Government's proposed Darling Harbour - White Bay elevated freeway has been forthcoming.

Most of us have become hardened to the revival of freeway proposals at election time, but we cannot afford to ignore them : one day they may materialize.

A proposal that included a high-level bridge to replace Glebe Island Bridge would have very grave consequences for Glebe. To justify the enormous expense, huge container terminals would be built on Glebe's waterfront, and passage of large lorries would increase correspondingly, using streets at present little affected. The proposed park on Rozelle Bay would be lost forever.

If, however, a freeway is devised which would divert traffic from residential streets, would not increase congestion in the inner city, involve the demolition of sound or historic housing, further split up communities or result in an unacceptable level of noise or visual pollution, the Glebe Society would support it. Members are encouraged to examine the details of freeway proposals when they are published to see if they meet these criteria.

THE HAROLD PARK SIGN (continued)

A meeting was held on Wednesday, 21st March at the Leichhardt Administrative Chambers to discuss the proposed sign prior to the hearing in April.

At the meeting were three Aldermen from Annandale and the Glebe, the areas affected by the sign, the Town Planning Officer for Leichhardt, a consultant to Harold Park, and about 20 residents of Annandale and the Glebe. After much discussion, the Leichhardt Council suggested that a compromise proposal which lowers the sign, be accepted. However, local residents favoured other schemes which would improve amenities for patrons at Harold Park and not intrude on the surrounding area.

The hearing on 5th - 9th April will take place as planned.

BICENTENNIAL COMMITTEE - Neil Macindoe

I have attended the last two meetings of Leichhardt Municipality Bicentennial Committee, together with representatives from our sister organisations within the municipality. It has been a good opportunity to meet these and other interested folk and listen to their views.

The Glebe-Annandale Bicentennial Park remains the most important project, especially now the State Government has bought the ANL terminal at Mort's Bay. The Committee is in the process of assessing and costing various projects, and I would be happy to hear of any further proposal from members of the Society or any other residents of Glebe.

The next meeting of the Committee will be advertised by the Secretary, Sarah Sheehan, after the Council elections. Meetings are held on Thursday nights at Leichhardt Town Hall.

FLORAL FENCING:

Some Council gardeners (most notably in Foley Park) have planted jasmine vines against the wire mesh fencing. Most of us would agree that jasmine looks and smells a good deal more attractive than wire, so do what you can to protect and encourage these plants (and the gardeners) please.



BIRDS IN JUBILEE PARK - Bara Marsh

After the article on birds in this area appeared in the Bulletin last year, many people rang me. Most bewailed the fact that Fairy Wrens have vanished from the Glebe Area. I am therefore delighted to report that two immature Blue Wrens spent quite a while in my garden in the middle of February. It is to be hoped that they were "casing the joint" for a desirable residence when they mate next Spring. Several people from Annandale told me that they see them in their gardens, so they have not too far to emigrate. For those who wish to encourage them, they like a thick thorny bush safe from cats preferably with yellow flowers nearby. They also like a large pile of dead branches - such as a dry bonfire - into which they can vanish at any sign of danger from larger birds.

Other interesting birds seen lately were a pair of red backed parrots in a tree in Victoria Street late in January; the Spangled Drongos came down from Queensland during the Summer and raised two young in the park; and one morning in March a sacred Kingfisher sat like a cluster of jewels on my neighbour's electricity line. Due to a plague of small brown moths recently we have had much attention - and music - from the tuneful Willie Wagtails, also known as Australian Nightingales because they often sing after dark.

ST PATRICK'S DAY SING-A-LONG

The evening started at 7.30 with 22 people being given green ribbons and ended at midnight with 'Land of Hope and Glory!' In between was a feast of good food and music.

We were particularly pleased that Lee Webster, a new member, came along. She has an encyclopedic knowledge of film music.


A special attraction is a collection of old paintings, including one of a steam driven timber mill, in Balmain and old photographs, some of which you might be able to identify - no one else has so far.
