#### BICENTENNIAL PROJECTS

## BICENTENNIAL COMMITTEE


Council has reviewed this Committee at short notice, having ignored it for one and a half years. Both State and Federal Governments will match Council spending, so there is potentially a lot of money for local projects.

The Society is joining with the Annandale and Balmain Associations in a proposal for a historical photo-montage of the principal streets of the Municipality. Various other projects, including the community centre at Bellevue-Venetia, have been dusted down and re-presented. Most other residents groups also have proposals, as have some firms. The NSW Bicentennial Committee has rejected the Society's Walks proposal.

#### REUSSDALE

The owners of the Abbey Restaurant have obtained the agreement of the Heritage Council to demolish the small cottage on their site and replace it with a reception hall, including underground parking. Plans for the restoration of the exterior of Reussdale are included in the proposal, though it is not clear how the restored building will be used.

The planning sub-committee agrees that this proposal is probably the best we can hope for. The sub-committee has suggested a range of improvements to the proposal, mainly concerned with landscaping.



#### AROUND BALMAIN

The book "Around Balmain" has been produced by the Balmain Association. The 56 -page book contains over 100 pictures of the area, together with brief descriptions. It is useful for anyone wishing to visit the historic peninsula. A frontispiece map provides a directory to the buildings and can act as a guide to those walking or driving around the area. ## PICNIC IN JUBILEE PARK

Our picnic in Jubilee Park on Sunday 9th March now combines pleasure with action. By coincidence the Annandale Association chose the same date and place for a major rally from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. to lobby for their part of the Rozelle Bay Park. The Glebe Society is giving full support to the rally. We will provide the public address system and will have an information stall. Many other societies and action groups will also be present and several interesting speakers have been invited. Our picnic will still start at 12 noon — come along and help swell the numbers.

GLEBE TOWN HALL

Our Town Hall is under-utilised, largely because it was built for a very specific administrative purpose, and the various spaces are difficult to adapt, especially when stripped of their original furnishings

Glebe Neighbourhood Centre puts some parts of the Town Hall to good use. Much more of it could be used if the roof were repaired. It is certainly much more attractive from the outside now it has been painted in the original colours, but the interior cannot be redecorated until the building is waterproof. Once this is done, I suggest the Society presses strongly for reducing the amount charged for the hiring of the halls for classes and performances. Better to accept a reduced income than drive people away.

Members should also consider the benifits of closing that portion of Mt. Vernon Street adjacent to the Town Hall. The 470 Bus route can be diverted to Westmoreland Street without difficulty. Adjacent open space would increase the possible uses for the Hall, as well as providing parkland in an area with very little. In particular, if an attractive childproof fence were added, the Hall and park could become another centre for occassional child care at a time when hundreds of young children will be moving to the area, and when existing occasional The Hall and care cannot be expanded. park would also be far more attractive for markets and fetes, and perhaps in time something of the former glory, or at least comfort of the main hall can be restored, thus attracting audiences. Road closures cause protest when they deny access or restrict movement. In this part of Glebe the roads are very wide and carry almost no traffic. It would be a pity if the closure of Mt. Vernon Street were disputed. The onus should be on those who oppose closure to show why the convenience of a few should prevail over the needs of many, and the proper utilisation of Glebe Town Hall.

# THE WILLIAMS OF GLEBE

Mr & Mrs P.C. Williams arrived in Sydney. 3rd July, 1853 on the Barque Meteor. The family went by Town Dray to a brick cottage in Mitchell Street, (one of four). Later this Mr. Williams owned all four, and leased land for Brickyards. The Glebe then was mostly Wattle and Daub, and weatherboard. The Great Grandfather of the present writer Mr G.W. F. Williams was a builder and established a number of ironmongery and builders hardware shops. Mr. G. Williams is asking the Glebe Society if any member can help him gather further information about his ancestors, mainly in the area of defining locations. # EDITOR'S RESEARCH Bulletin No 4 of 1974

The honour of initiating the first work on The Glebe belongs to Mrs P.C. Williams. There was no municipality at the time. One day, Dr. Fowles called at Mrs Williams residence in Mitchell Street to attend one of her children. He drew attention to the necessity of a drain across the road and when Mrs Williams said her husband would contribute a guinea towards the cost the Doctor proffered a similar sum. Altogether Mrs Williams collected seven pounds and for this sum Mr Gallagher laid down a stone drain. The first act of the Municipal Council was to replace that drain with a smaller one and the result of the change was that Mr and Mrs Williams were flooded out of their house.
