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REPORT ON THE 19TH ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

The 19th AGM of the Glebe Society, held on Wednesday 10th August, was well attended. Those present had an interesting and informative evening.

Peter Strickland's President's Report gave a comprehensive resume of the past year's efforts. A copy of this report is included with your Bulletin.

The Treasurer's report, prepared by Peter O'Gorman and presented by Peter Strickland, showed that the Society's financial position is sound, but that we will need the extra income which we hope to generate from the House Inspection to enable us to carry out our future plans.

Neil Macindoe presented the Planning Subcommittee's report, which praised the new Council's open policy, which has enabled the Society to present submissions knowing that they will be examined on their merits. Other matters included in the Planning Report have been, or will be, covered fully in our Bulletins.

Jeanette Knox's Traffic Report also praised the new Council. Jeanette has had several meetings with the convenor of the Council Traffic Committee, Ald. Betty Leone, which have been beneficial. Traffic problems will continue, but Leichhardt Council is now more sympathetic.

John Hoddinott reported on the Light Rail proposal, saying that little has been achieved in the 8 years that the Society has been promoting the idea. (See p.4 for the latest developments.)

In his report on progress towards the Bicentennial Park, John Buckingham suggested that the Society should press for extension of the park to the Annandale side. He also said that the marina issue will resurface and should be examined on its own merits, and that the cleaning up of Rozelle Bay should be pursued.

Maureen Colman, who has been investigating the problem of Wentworth Park, reported that the problem is so great that no advances Globe Capital Tea. Atcherley & Dawson, Sydney; 1904.



have been made in the past year. A concerted effort is needed to push the Government into stirring the Wentworth Park Trust into action and Maureen felt that she did not have enough time available to do the task justice.

After these reports had been presented, the motions listed in the August Bulletin were discussed and passed with only minor changes.

The election of officers then took place. Peter Strickland, Jeffrey Ibbotson and Andrew Wood are continuing in their previous positions. Peter Kolbe was elected Treasurer and Marianne von Knobelsdorff as a Committee member. Further volunteers for the Committee will be welcome.

The meeting closed at approximately 11pm.

Members will recall the Committee requesting classification and a heritage study for a row of three post-Regency buildings which, like Juniper Hall in Paddington, once was concealed behind shopfronts. These three buildings, behind Glebe Point Road shops between Palmerston Street and Ferry Road, are Salem House, Lynwood and a gardener's cottage. They are contemporary with Rothwell Lodge, 24 Ferry Road, and only fifty metres distant. Rothwell Lodge is now protected by a Permanent Conservation Order and is being restored by the noted conservation architect Otto Cserhalmi, who has recently joined the Society and will move both family and business to the site. Mr Cserhalmi is also restoring Glebe Town Hall.

Recently a development application was lodged with Leichhardt Council to totally demolish everything on the corner of Glebe Point Road and Ferry Road, including the shops from 335 to 341. No 335 is the perfectly preserved bootmaker's shop still used by Eric Shaw, with the recent aid of an assistant. Behind 341, La Vera Pizza, are a number of terrace houses, and these will also be destroyed. An even more grievous loss will be the 1840's gardener's cottage, which is situated behind these shops.

The proposed replacement is on three levels; a below-ground area holding 20 cars, a ground level with four replacement shops and office space at the back, and an upper floor consisting entirely of office space. The facade is well designed and would blend in quite well with existing two-storey shopfronts in the same block.

The Committee is very concerned, however, that the new building appears to have three times the floor space permitted by IDO 27, the instrument controlling Neighbourhood Business.

Therefore, despite its sympathetic design, the proposed development not only grossly exceeds planning limits, but also involves loss of accommodation and destruction of rare and irreplaceable buildings. HAROLD PARK HOTEL

We hope that residents won't experience problems from increased activities at the Harold Park Hotel. If there are problems, please let the Committee know.

The volume of business at the AGM precluded the formation of this new Sub-committee and members are now encouraged to join in a very pleasant and rewarding task.

Projects the Sub-committee could consider include the collection of historical data on buildings in Glebe, especially those of unusual interest but without current additional protection, a photographic survey of Glebe (or at least a plan for one), and a survey of mature plantings, parks and other heritage features.

Membership of this Sub-committee is wellsuited to retired, unemployed or disabled folk who have wanted to make a contribution for their own satisfaction but who have been uncertain how it might be done.

There are many other tasks involving filing, record-keeping, newspaper clipping and research which would be of value to the Society but are too time-consuming for Committee Members and Convenors, who are generally managing full-time jobs and major campaigns as well. If you would like to help, have some spare time and can work without supervision, please contact a Committee Member.

CLASSIFICATION FOR PARKS

The National Trust has asked the Society to nominate Glebe parks of heritage significance. The Committee is considering nomination of at least five major Glebe parks and will request inclusion of all those nominated in the Glebe Conservation Area.



OTHER PLANNING MATTERS

The Planning Sub-committee has resubmitted a number of issues to Leichhardt Council and has added another nine more recent issues.

The Sub-committee has drawn the attention of both Leichhardt Council and the National Trust to the recent disfigurement of the attractive pair of classified terraces, 207-209 Glebe Point Road (previously Bassett's Restaurant).

Objections are being lodged to two other Glebe Point Road developments, one (195-197) because of unsympathetic facade treatment and the other (303) as a gross overdevelopment. The Sub-committee has also written requesting preservation of the existing terrace and cobblestones of Marchant's Garage (174-176 Bridge Road).

Planning for the inspection is now well underway. So far these are the confirmed "openers":

Private residences should be included, but there has been a deafeningly silent response from members. Insurance has been arranged which should cover most concerns. Limiting numbers inside at any one time should help control the wallpaper scratchers and carpet lifters.

But the crowds will only be kept at bay if there is a good number of minders available. Again the response has been underwhelming.

If the weather is kind there could be a large number of people to shepherd around. So far enquiries have come in from four historical societies. One wishes to bring a bus load of visitors. We will need all members to help.

Each building will need a head minder to wander in and out during the day. Two minders will be needed for the morning (10 to 1) and two for the afternoon (2-5) If there are 15 buildings open we will need 75 minders! So ring Jeff Ibbotson (660 7713) or Sue Littleton (660 5610) to secure your place at your favourite building. Remember each minder receives a free ticket.

Lyndhurst will be open on both Saturday and Sunday to the general public. This will be Lyndhurst's grand opening. We have been asked to have a stall. Again we will need members on the Saturday to help publicise the Society's activities and sell tickets for Sunday's inspection. Help on both days and receive a double free ticket to compensate for your sore feet:

BICENTENNIAL PARK UPDATE

Most members will be pleased to see the progress taking place in the Bicentennial Park. However the intransigence of the squatters remains an obstacle. The case is due to be heard in the Supreme Court on Friday 23rd September, but even if that finalises things very quickly the delay to the park caused by the squatters will inevitably lead to both the demolition contractor and the development contractor requiring compensatory payments. The extra cost caused by squatters will inevitably be borne by rate-payers of the Municipality.

Despite that sour note, we still see the possibility of the park being completed by Christmas and certainly Council intends having the opening some time in December.

Thanks to those people who made suggestions concerning means to keep motor bikes out of the park, while allowing wheelchairs in. The best of these suggestions, the careful placing of obstacle blocks, has been taken up by the landscape architect, Bruce McKenzie, who will work on a design which will not detract in any way from the park.

LIGHT RAIL

Earlier this year the Society wrote to Leichhardt Municipal Council urging it to support a feasibility study for Light Rail. A copy of the Glebe Society Light Rail Monograph, prepared by John Gerofi, was also sent to Council. The Town Planner recommended that Council support the proposal.

The Mayor invited the Society to a meeting with Aldermen to discuss the matter. John Hoddinott and members of the Committee met with the Mayor and other Aldermen on August 20th.

We are happy to report that Council whole-heartedly supports the Light Rail concept. As Ald. Spedding remarked, it is one of the few issues where Council has voted 12 - 0 in favour.

John Hoddinott is to consult John Gerofi and prepare a more detailed proposal to publicise the concept and gain Government and private enterprise support.

Another Train Ride is in the wind. Watch this space!

Leichhardt Municipal Council RECYCLING SERVICE



Please place all glass bottles and jars as well as newspapers and cardboard, rest drink bottles (with the distinctive dark base cup) aluminium cans and clean steel food cans, in cartons outside your front gate on the night before...

This service appears to be working well and we encourage all members to support it. If your household did not receive the notice about it, phone the Council to find out the dates for your area.

Other useful means of disposing of unwanted articles are special Wednesday pickups, made free by the Council if you ring them, and the Council Tip, 50-54 Moore Street, Leichhardt, which accepts non-putrescible materials from 7.45 to 11.30am and 1 to 3.45pm on Saturdays and Sundays.

GLEBE SOCIETY BADGES?

Some members have suggested that we provide members with badges to wear at Society functions and when representing the Society. Do we need badges, and if so, what design?

MetroTen bus tickets are now in full operation, but have been little publicized. However they are a great invention, saving both time and money. For journeys of up to 9 sections, you save 45% on normal fares by buying a ticket for 10 journeys in advance; the \$2 fare costs only \$1.10 and the \$1 fare only 55c. There is no time limit on MetroTen tickets and you can use them to pay for a friend's fare too.

Travelpass tickets, which can save up to 50% on bus, train and ferry fares are also available, but as the savings depend on the number of journeys made during a specified period, they are only of use to regular travellers.

The advantages of these new tickets are:

- 1. You save money
- There is no need to look for your change or to carry change
- 3. Entry to the bus is quicker. You just stick the ticket into the red validator machine at the entry of any bus.

If more people bought these tickets, or if <u>all</u> tickets had to be bought in advance, as in Germany and Switzerland, the advantages would be tremendous. MetroTen tickets would be even better if they also could be used for all types of transport.

The faster bus service resulting from the driver getting on with driving the bus, instead of collecting fares, would attract more people to use public transport instead of private cars. This would mean less traffic jams and less pollution. There would also be more revenue for the Urban Transit Authority, which could use the money to provide a more effective service by, for instance, increasing the frequency of routes like the 459.

MetroTen tickets can be purchased at selected newsagents, at railway stations near bus routes or at bus depots.



PUBLIC TRANSPORT SUB-COMMITTEE
