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WENTWORTH PARK

Now that the Society's efforts to establish the Bicentennial Park have come to fruition, we must turn our attention to that vast wasteland that was once almost as grand as the Botanic Gardens.

The task is not easy. The committee will coordinate the action, but it would make the job easier if there was a core of four or five other members who could help push it along.

We understand that some of the trustees are up for reappointment next year, so now is the time to exert some preasure. The Society has written to the Trust suggesting immediate and long term goals for the park and has sought a meeting with the Trust.

Sandra Nori recently met with the Trust to discuss improvements for children in the area, including a skate board area. She reported that the Trust was reasonably receptive to the idea and may even be as bold as to consult with residents concerning the improvements which can be made.

It is especially important to collect signatures from street between Glebe Point Road and Wentworth Park. SYDNEY CITY STRATEGY PLAN RELEASED

The Sydney City Plan shows that development is moving further west, that is, closer to Glebe. It does not take into consideration the effect this will have on Glebe, and especially the effect on traffic.

Several Committee members have worked on a response to the plan. The Society is also responding through the Australia Conservation Foundation's Urban Environment Coalition, our President being a member of the Steering Committee.

PRIORITIES FOR WENTWORTH PARK

URGENT

- Provision of permanent, well drained paths for people crossing the park. It is constantly used by people walking to and from work, Ultimo Primary School and Wentworth Park Kindergarten, as well as persons actually using the park.
- 2 Rehabilitation, construction and maintenance of public toilets. Without these facilities park users, especially families, are limited in the amount of time they can spend in the park. Larger groups using the park for picnics or sports are seriously disadvantaged.
- 3 Improved play equipment at both ends of the park. Seating and equipment should be painted, repaired or brought up to standard. If dangerous, they should be replaced. The accumulation of broken glass, especially near the swingsat the south end should receive particular attention.
- 4 Landscaping and planting of the largest possible area .
- 5 Provision of a safe crossing over Wentworth Park Road, either by way of pedestrian bridge, traffic lights, pedestrian refuge or road closure. The road is a speedway at present and it is not safe for children to cross unaided.
- 6 Limit the area used for parking. Parking should only be provided in the smallest possible space and must be regarded as a temporary measure only until suitable parking facilities are found in adjacent areas such as the City Council depot. Parking should be immediately banned in wet weather.

LONG TERM

- I Investigate alternative schemes of transport, including light rail and buses using the viaduct and current routes. Investigate alternative parking arrangements such as full or partial road closures and use of adjacent sites such as the Council depot.
- Commission a long term stage by stage plan for the development of the park as a major regional open space. Investigate the use of the dog track for athletics and fitness tracks, and its suitability for regional school athletics training and carnivals. Small fields can be utilised by minority sports. Redesign the centre of the park, demolishing the unused stands on the eastern side of the track to create a link between each half of the park. Institute a programme of upgrading that includes improved, relocated sports areas, picnic areas surrounded by trees and connected by tree lined avenues.
- 3 Emphasize the regional link between the park and adjacent green space Glebe High School and the proposed waterfront walkway to Blackwattle Bay and Jubilee Parks. Establish both recreational and commuter bicycle routes to connect with the fish markets, Darling Harbour and the city.

PLEASE RETURN ALL COMPLETED WENTWORTH PARK PETITIONS TO PO BOX 100, GLEBE, OR TO A COMMITTEE MEMBER BY SUNDAY 15TH JANUARY. Growths of mangroves and Chinese market gardens were a feature of the foreshores of Glebe Point in 1879. By 1899 reclamation of the swampy flats on Glebe's north western boundary by the Public Works Department was largely completed and Annandale and Glebe Councils became joint trustees of the reclaimed lands. George Williamson, a Glebe alderman proposed that part of the site become "large and commodious baths" with water supplied by a canal. Other aldermen, however did not share his enthusiasm. By 1903 this precinct was a favourite haunt for two-up games but gamblers moved elsewhere after police raids.

The Glebe Town Clerk told Annandale that it was "useless to approach the government for money" in 1904 but within two years Glebe Council was preparing the grounds for tree planting. An area of 10-1/2 acres was dedicated for public recreation purposes on 23 September 1908 and after the Crown acquired further land from G. B. Allen, the new reserve within Glebe municipality covered 13 acres 1 rood. As Glebe celebrated 50 years of municipal government in 1909, it was called Jubilee Park. The park featured winding paths, flower beds, a variety of trees including Moreton Bay figs and palms and in 1923 a rotunda was formally opened by Mayor Stanley Cole on 31 August 1910 when The Glebe Brass Band entertained the crowd playing "Sacred & Classical Music".

Glebe Council agreed that in return for the local cricket club laying down a turf wicket on a portion of the public lands it would erect a picket fence for a cricket field and provide a pavilion at a cost of 80 pounds. The Glebe Rate Payers Association and the St. Johns Institute, irate at part of the new park being fenced off, protested vigorously.

In March 1910 Glebe Council appointed Thomas Dowse as the park ranger. Born in Devon, England in 1866, he began work at the park at 5am and kept it in magnificent condition. In his report of 1914, Mayor F. L. Artlett proudly declared "Our park has been well maintained and our street plantations are bright spots and reflect credit on Mr Dowse who has always exhibited energy and ability in his duties". On his death in 1933, local cricketers erected a plaque to the memory of Thomas Dowse in the pavilion.

On Sundays promenading down Glebe Point Road to the park to listen to the band was a popular pastime



and on Saturdays after the war, carnivals, galas and fairs at Jubilee Park were also important outlets for pleasure, helping to raise funds for the local Distress Society, the War Memorial Committee and the Working Men's Institute.

The Glebe District Cricket Club abandoned Wentworth Park in 1923 and established Jubilee Oval as the main ground for its first grade fixtures and there was also considerable activity on the waters of Rozelle Bay as oarsmen tested their skills at the oar. The Glebe Club began championship races from either Annandale wharf or the Gordon Street wharf and in 1907 they were joined by members of the University Boat Club when they erected their boatshed at Rozelle Bay. A third rowing club, Police, established their shed at Federal Road in 1933. Though local cricketers paid to play, cricket remained one of the cheapest forms of entertainment and occupied an important place in the lives of many local people. Between 2,000 and 3,000 people walked to Jubilee Oval on Saturday afternoon to watch the grade cricket. First grade games were played at Jubilee up to the 1965/66 season.

In 1935 Stephen McCormack said the park was a disgrace with the grass knee-high and the wickets were below the standard required. Groundsman Cooper responded by saying that it was difficult to cut the grass with an obsolete machine and new boots were required for the horse to prepare the pitch. The Glebe Citizens Rebel Committee requested the local Council to hand over the sheep and goat which grazed in the park for the unemployed to eat and suggested Council employ some of those out of work to mow the grass these animals ate. Mayor Frank Dick was unsympathetic—"a goat was mentioned in the letter but they forgot to mention the goat who put forward the proposal."

4 PLANNING REPORT

The NSW Trotting Club was gambling on Sydney winning the competition for the 1996 Olympics in order to secure the best possible deal for its proposed move to Homebush. When Melbourne became the Australian candidate, a speedy departure from Glebe seemed less likely. On p55 of the November 22nd SMH the Minister for Racing, Bob Rowland-Smith, was reported as saying that the Government would go ahead with the move to Homebush Bay, but in The Eastern Herald on 24th November he said the Government would now have to reassess its position and that "It is now in the lap of the Gods".

Members will probably have noticed the bull-dozers at work excavating the Sugar's Yard site in Glebe Point Road. The Committee expects a modified plan for a number of shops with underground parking to come before Council soon.

The Pudding Shop and its neighbours have undergone a wonderful transformation lately with a richly painted parapet and matching awning by Kim Mackell, brother of Roger Mackell, proprietor of Glebe Books and a Society member. Please do not crowd around with offers and suggestions just yet, however, as Kim is in Italy for a year on a scholarship. Hopefully he will do more murals to lift other drab buildings when he returns.

A much less attractive paint job is the one on 207-209 Glebe Point Road, formerly Bassett's (previous proprietor Peter Torok, Society member and co-founder of the Glebe Street Fair) and now the Saigon Pearl. The Planning Sub-committee has protested to the new owner, to Leichhardt Council and to the National Trust, so far without result. There is a need for members to make their dissatisfaction with the paintwork clear, without giving the proprietor reason to believe he has cause to complain of discrimination. The buildings are classified.

A CHRISTMAS LETTER TO COUNCIL

The developer of the Marchant's Garage site in Bridge Road is proposing to demolish a two storey terrace, 174 Bridge Road, and include the site in his redevelopment. This section of Bridge Road is particularly rich in fine old buildings, some of which members were able to inspect on the Glebe Open Day. The affected terrace dates from about 1890, but reflects an earlier style with roundheaded arches over windows and doors. Not only would it be a considerable loss in itself and to the Conservation Area, but its retention would narrow the frontage of the new development, making it less conspictuous.

Members are requested to write a 'Christmas Special' to Leichhardt Council calling for the preservation of 174 Bridge Road. We do not want a repetition of 215 Bridge Road (Bridge Gardens). Previous Councils have inclined to the view that because Bridge Road carries so much traffic, development can be less sympathetic and more intense. The recent repainting of Magnolia Terrace, one of many grand Classified buildings in Bridge Road, shows what a metamorphosis is possible.

RECEPTION CENTRE FOR THE ABBEY RESTAURANT

Another plan (the fourth) for a reception centre at 156 Bridge Road is before Council. The development proposes the demolition of Hamilton Cottage, an old but unremarkable cottage built by Ferdinand Reuss. In its place, at the extreme north-east corner of the site, well back from Bridge Road, is to be a single storey structure about seven metres to the rooftop (slightly above the eaves of the existing old church/restaurant) about 20 metres wide and 24 metres deep. The height is owing to partly underground parking for 40 cars. In front of this hall and kitchen, closer to Bridge Road, is an L-shaped portico with a courtyard and gazebo in the angle. Both the portico and hall present a row of classical, round-headed arches with sandstone pilasters and rendered finish. Ingress is from Bridge Road to the left of the church and egress into Bridge Road to the right.

The Society has previously agreed to the demolition of Hamilton Cottage provided Reussdale is satisfactorily restored and any new development is also satisfactory. The Committee will now seek assurance that Reussdale's restoration is to take place immediately. Interested members should view the plans at Leichhardt Council Chambers. The Committee is keen to hear members' comments.

(The Minister for Local Government and Minister for Planning, the Hon. David Hay, has responded sympathetically to the letter we sent him about Reussdale, as a result of a Motion passed at our AGM. He conveys to Society members 'his appreciation for the concern demonstrated by the Society for the heritage of New South Wales'.)



HOUSE INSPECTION

This year's inspection turned out to be a great success. Fifteen buildings were open. There were enough minders for all the buildings (just). The weather was even kind to us.

It was a little daunting to arrive at 10 o'clock at Lyndhurst to find a bus load of visitors almost banging on the door. Others waiting swelled the numbers to about 100. Quick work by Maureen Coleman and Les Hart soon had everyone armed with their ticket and guide booklet.

Numbers evened out during the day and the event proceeded very smoothly. Over 500 tickets were sold. Visitors came from all over Sydney and some from out of town.

The SMH Metro and back page Our Town sections mentioned the event. A well timed letter to the editor of the Financial Review countered an article on the gentrification of Glebe and invited readers to see for themselves.

The broad range of buildings open enabled visitors to see what a mix of buildings there is in Glebe.

The innovation for this year's inspection was the production of a guide booklet which gave visitors much more detail on Glebe and its buildings than had been possible in previous years.

From the comments made by visitors, it was all worthwhile. There were a number of requests for a repeat. So, if you missed out this year, now is your chance to volunteer to organise the next one in two Years' time!

Whilst the list of helpers is too long to name eveyone who helped to make the event such a success, some deserve special mention.

Firstly our gratitude should go to the owners who allowed the tramp of feet through their homes. Hamish Mackay came back to town to show visitors over Demeter Bakery and to explain the Steiner concept behind the enterprise. Thanks also go to Rulof Smilde for opening The Hermitage and showing how a home of such big proportions can be adapted to today's needs.

Betty Wright and Cynthia Jones nearly wore their fingers to the bone typing letters and the first draft of the guide.

Edwina ensured all the printing was done on time and helped with layouts. Peter

Strickland organised the illustrations commissioned for the guide and finalised its layout.

On the day visitors appreciated the helpfullness of the minders who went beyond the call of duty to explain a building's features, or like Alan Hunt who led groups around and pointed out features which visitors may have missed.

It was an advantage to hold the open day in conjunction with the opening of Lyndhurst. Our thanks go to Peter Watts and his team for opening Lyndhurst early for us and making a stall available to publicise our activities.

Income from the event produced a handy surplus as well as a large supply of guide booklets.



GLEBE STREET FAIR



Published to coincide with this year's house inspection, the guide is an expanded version of the old walking guide. The booklet takes the form of an extended walking tour. Starting at Hereford House in Hereford Street, visitors are guided through Toxteth Estate to Glebe Point Blackwattle Bay Park, up Glebe Point Road, across to Lyndhurst, up through the Glebe Estate to St John's and Bridge Roads, then through Forest Lodge before finishing back at Hereford House. The tour may be started at any point along the way.

The booklet has a fold out map for easy reference, introductory notes and is well illustrated with drawings of notable buildings. Two drawings, of Toxteth Park and Bidura were especially done by Jennifer Porter .
